The Early Childhood Mental

Health Network provides expert mental health services and supports for children from birth to age 5 and their families, as well as training opportunities for early childhood professionals.



The network is made up of:

- Seven Early Childhood Therapeutic Centers that:
 - Are located across all five boroughs
 - Provide culturally sensitive services in several languages
 - Offer short wait times for appointments
 - Accept Medicaid and other types of insurance
- A citywide Training and Technical Assistance Center, which is a collaboration between the New York Center for Child Development and the McSilver Institute for Poverty Policy and Research at New York University.

What an Early Childhood Therapeutic Center Offers

Clinical services for children and families:

- Individual, family and group therapies for young children and their families
- Comprehensive assessment and care planning
- Parent education

Family Peer Support services for parents and caregivers:

- Help advocating for their children's needs
- Emotional support
- Connection to communitybased resources

Consultation services* for early care and education staff:

- Partnerships with teachers to develop classroom strategies to address the social-emotional needs of children
- Program-wide workshops and staff training

The Training and Technical Assistance Center builds the skills of mental health professionals and other early childhood professionals to identify and address the socialemotional needs of children from birth to age 5 and their families through:
